A Bill to Ban Preharvest Crop Burning

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2. **SECTION 1.** The United States shall ban preharvest crop burning.
- 3. **SECTION 2.** Preharvest crop burning shall be defined as the intentional burning of crops to reduce
- 4. organic waste before harvesting.
- 5. A. Controlled burns used to prevent the spread of wildfires are not included.
- 6. **SECTION 3.** The United States Department of Agriculture shall oversee the enforcement of this
- 7. legislation.
- 8. Any private or public entity found in violation of this legislation shall be fined
- 9. \$500,000 per infraction.
- 10. **SECTION 4.** This legislation will go into effect the fiscal year after passage.
- 11. **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Disarm the US Nuclear Stockpile

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2. **SECTION 1.** The US Armed Forces will disarm all nuclear weapons in its stockpile
- 3. **SECTION 2.** Disarmament will involve deactivating the weapon and destroying or reusing its
- 4. materials, and will also prevent the military from creating new nuclear weapons.
- 5. **SECTION 3.** The Department of Defense will receive 44 billion dollars annually to collect, deactivate,
- 6. and recycle or destroy all nuclear weapons under possession by the US Armed Forces.
- 7. A. 44 billion dollars is how much the military spent on maintaining nuclear weapons
- 8. in 2021, so those funds will simply be reallocated to the Department of Defense.
- 9. **SECTION 4.** This bill will fall into effect on January 1st, 2025.
- 10. **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

- 7. symbols, and speaking openly about their religion. Repercussions shall be defined as
- 8. suspension from pay, fired from their job, and being reported to the state.
- 9. **SECTION 3.** The school board shall be responsible for protecting their teachers and defending
- 10. them against those who infringe on their religious freedom.
- 11. **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect July 1, 2024.
- 12. **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

- 2. **SECTION 1.** The US Government will allocate 50 billion dollars to improve interstate highways. This
- 3. money will cover filling potholes and repaving sections of roads in disrepair.
- 4. **SECTION 2.** "Interstate highways": the network of U.S. limited-access federally-funded roadways
- 5. connecting the 48 contiguous states, and those in Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico.
- 6. **SECTION 3.** The funding will come out of the Department of Transportation budget.
- 7. A. This bill will be enforced by the National Highway Administration.
- 8. B. If unused, funds will be reabsorbed by the Department of Transportation.
