### A Resolution to Abolish the Debt Ceiling

- 1 WHEREAS, The United States is the only developed nation that imposes an arbitrary
- 2 borrowing limit on itself; and
- 3 **WHEREAS**, The nature of the debt ceiling makes it possible for one faction in the
- 4 Congress to hold the rest of the government hostage; and
- 5 **WHEREAS**, The debt ceiling conflicts with federal spending bills, creating the potential 6 for recurring crises; now, therefore, be it
- 7 **RESOLVED**, That the Student Congress here assembled calls for the federal debt
- 8 ceiling to be abolished; and be it
- 9 **FURTHER RESOLVED**, That any borrowing necessary to execute spending legislation
- 10 adopted by the Congress be deemed authorized upon passage of such legislation.

#### A Resolution to Nationalize the Coal Industry

1 WHEREAS, Coal as a fuel source for electric power generation is utterly

2 unsustainable; and

3 **WHEREAS**, The coal mining industry is collapsing under competition from natural gas 4 and renewables; and

- 5 **WHEREAS**, The collapse of an entire industry generates significant social costs that
- 6 can and should be mitigated through careful planning; and
- 7 **WHEREAS**, The private sector has been unable to mitigate the costs to coal miners
- 8 and communities, instead choosing to take short-term profits and to leave a mess to
- 9 be cleaned up at taxpayer expense; and
- 10 **WHEREAS**, A government takeover of the industry would facilitate an orderly
- 11 shutdown of coal mining in the United States; now, therefore, be it
- 12 **RESOLVED**, That the Student Congress here assembled calls for the federal
- 13 government to nationalize the coal mining industry for the purpose of shutting down
- 14 the industry's operations with all deliberate speed.

### A Resolution to Propose a Constitutional Amendment to Empower Congress to Pass Term Limits for the United States Congress

1 WHEREAS, Members of the Congress of the United States serve for too long; and

2 WHEREAS, Members of Congress have become out of touch with constituents; and

3 **WHEREAS**, Members of Congress have become entrenched in their position; and

4 **WHEREAS**, Members of Congress have become increasingly elderly, the average age 5 being far above the median age of the American citizen; now, therefore, be it

6 **RESOLVED**, By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the following article

7 is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall be 8 valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when ratified by the

9 legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within five years from the date of its 10 submission by the congress:

11 ARTICLE --

12 **SECTION 1**: The Congress shall have the sole authority to make legislation regarding 13 the creation or modification of term limits for Members of the Congress of the United 14 States.

15 **SECTION 2**: The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate

16 legislation.

#### A Bill to Levy a Tax on Extreme Wealth

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. A tax of 5 percent shall be levied annually upon the aggregate
- 3 wealth, in excess of \$1 billion, of all United States persons.
- 4 **SECTION 2**. Definitions:
- 5 A. As used herein, "wealth" shall include all assets wherever held (including
- 6 beneficial interests in trusts, partnerships, and limited liability companies) less
- 7 any debts secured by said assets.
- 8 B. As used herein, "United States persons" shall include natural persons who
- 9 are citizens or residents of the United States and those who have renounced their
- 10 citizenship within the previous 20 years, but after the effective date of this bill.
- 11 **SECTION 3**. The U.S. Department of the Treasury shall be responsible for enforcing 12 the provisions of this bill.
- 13 **SECTION 4**. The provisions of this bill shall take effect on January 1, 2024.
- 14 **SECTION 5**. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A Resolution to Make Medicaid a Federally Administered Program

- 1 **WHEREAS**, Medicaid is currently a program jointly funded and administered by
- 2 federal and state governments; and
- 3 **WHEREAS**, As a result, Medicaid eligibility and benefits vary widely from state to
- 4 state, creating gross inequalities in public health; and
- 5 **WHEREAS**, States' refusal to participate in the Medicaid expansion has led to harmful 6 outcomes, including thousands of premature deaths; and
- 7 **WHEREAS**, Federal administration of Medicaid would result in fairer outcomes, lower 8 costs, and better public health for the most vulnerable; now, therefore, be it
- 9 **RESOLVED**, That the Student Congress here assembled calls for Medicaid to be
- 10 converted to a fully federally administered program.

### A Resolution to Propose a Constitutional Amendment to Require Demonstrated Knowledge to Qualify as a Congressional Candidate

1 **WHEREAS**, Members of Congress have demonstrated a shocking lack of knowledge 2 of history and civic issues even as they continue to hold office; and

3 **WHEREAS**, This lack of knowledge contributes to poor policy decisions and ineffective 4 lawmaking; and

5 **WHEREAS**, By implementing a test for Congressional candidates, voters will be aware 6 of candidates' civic, political, and international knowledge; now, therefore, be it

7 **RESOLVED**, By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the following article

8 is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall be 9 valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when ratified by the

10 legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within seven years from the date of 11 its submission by the Congress:

12 ARTICLE --

13 **SECTION** 1: No person shall be elected to the office of Representative or Senator

14 without having attained at least a 60% score on a test of international relations, public 15 policy, and United States history, law, and government, within the twelve months

16 preceding Election Day.

17 **SECTION 2**: This article shall take effect three years after ratification.

18 **SECTION 3**: The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate

19 legislation.
