B

A Bill to Make Driving in Flip Flops a Ticketable Offense

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 SECTION 1. Wearing flip-flops while driving shall be a Class B traffic infraction in thestate of Colorado.

4 **SECTION 2**. Flip-flops shall be defined as a light sandal, typically of plastic or rubber, with a thong between the big and second toe.

6 Class B traffic infraction shall be defined as a minor traffic violation that is 7 punishable by \$15 to \$100 plus a small surcharge and no DMV points.

8 SECTION 3. Colorado State Patrol will oversee the enforcement of this bill.

A. Police officers will not be permitted to pull cars over because the
driver is wearing flip-flops, but if the officer pulls the automobile over
for a different traffic violation, the officer may also ticket the driver in
violation of this law.

A Bill To ban Energy Drinks That Exceed 400 mg Of Caffeine Per Drink

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1.	This Bill seeks to ban the sale and distribution of energy drinks that contain
	more than 400mg of caffeine per serving to protect public health,
	especially that of young consumers who may be particularly vulnerable to
	the adverse effects of excessive caffeine consumption.
SECTION 2.	a)Energy drinks are any of various types of beverage that are considered a
	source of energy, especially a soft drink containing a high percentage of
	sugar and/or caffeine or other stimulant. b)Young consumers refer to all
	individuals under the age of 21. c)Caffeine pertains to the naturally
	occurring or added caffeine content present in the beverage.
SECTION 3.	The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) shall oversee the enforcement of
•	this policy. The FDA will monitor and regulate the caffeine content in
	energy drinks through product labeling and compliance checks. The FDA is
	also responsible for conducting periodic assessments of the impact of this
	regulation on public health.
SECTION 4.	Violations of this act shall result in fines and potential revocation of
	licenses for manufacturers and distributors of energy drinks exceeding the
	specified caffeine limit.
SECTION 5.	This legislation shall take effect 90 days after the Bill is passed.

A Bill to Eliminate and Manage Low Head Dams

 17 encouragement for the creation of a sustained international oversight mechanism to ensure the
 18 effective implementation of a peace agreement, rehabilitation, reconstruction, and guarantee
 19 of non-recurrence of conflict.
