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## **Keeping Restroom Areas Concealed Act**

1.	BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY THAT:		
2.	SECTION 1.	Schools in Ohio are hereby required to restructure to eliminate cracks and gaps in	
3.		restroom stalls to give more privacy to students.	
4.	SECTION 2.	All public, chartered, and nonpublic schools are included. Cracks between the door of	
5.		the stall and the wall must be less than $\ensuremath{\%}$ inch wide, and the door and surrounding walls	
6.		must be no more than three inches above the floor and eight feet in height. Urinals must	
7.		have dividers that extend at least two feet away from the wall, and eight feet high, no	
8.		more than three inches above the floor.	
9.	SECTION 3.	Funding for these renovations will be allocated by the Ohio Department of Education	
10.		according to each school's need.	
11.		A. Schools found to be in noncompliance will receive 10% less state funding per	
12.		year	
13.	SECTION 4.	This bill shall go into effect in the 2025-2026 school year.	
14.	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

2.	SECTION 1.	The United States Department of Agriculture will begin accepting applications from	
3.		United States citizens requesting access to the underground cheese located in the State	
4.		of Missouri. The application will become available on the United States Department of	
5.		Agriculture's website. Accepted applications will result in an amount of cheese, up to	
6.		one pound, being shipped directly to the applicant's residence.	
7.	SECTION 2.	Underground cheese refers to the 1.5 billion pounds of cheese that the federal	
8.		government has stored underground using taxpayer funds.	
9.	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of Agriculture will oversee this legislation.	
10.		A. Every adult in the United States shall be eligible to apply to receive up to one	
11.		pound of cheese-free of charge-per month until supplies run out.	
12.		B. This legislation shall expire when the supply of cheese is no longer adequate to	
13.		sustain demand.	
14.		C. The intent of this legislation is to deplete the current supply to prevent waste and	
15.		allow for storage of new product.	
16.		D. Funding will be reallocated from the current dairy subsidies that the federal	
17.		government uses to purchase the cheese.	
18.	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall be enacted at the start of the next fiscal year.

- 6. **SECTION 3.** A driver relying solely on the self-driving mechanism of a car will be fined at least \$1000
- 7. and have their license suspended for up to 30 days on the first offense. States and
- 8. counties may choose to increase penalties as they see fit.
- 9. **SECTION 4.** The Department of Transportation and local law enforcement agencies, including police
- 10. forces, shall oversee the enforcement of this bill.
- 11. **SECTION 5.** This legislation will come into effect upon passing.

2.	SECTION 1.	The US Government will limit the use of farm subsidies to only those farms that have	
3.		evidenced the use of regenerative agricultural systems that support microbial	
4.		biodiversity and soil health.	
5.	SECTION 2.	Regenerative agricultural techniques that support microbial biodiversity and soil health	
6.		include; diverse crop rotations; decreased and limited use of harmful fertilizers and	
7.		pesticides, as well as the containment and prevention of fertilizer and pesticide runoff	
8.		from reaching our public waterways; use of cover crops; no-till farming; integrated	
9.		livestock management	
10.	SECTION 3.	U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will oversee the enforcement of this bill and	
11.		develop the criteria to qualify for and award any farming subsidies.	
12.	SECTION 4.	This bill would go into effect one year after passage. This will ensure that all farmers will	
13.		have one calendar year to adjust any current practices that degrade soil health.	
14.	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

5.		emergency medical technician, or other individual who responds to emergencies.		
6.		"Health care worker" includes healthcare professionals who provide medical or other		
7.		health-related care or treatment including those who do so under the direction of a		
8.		healthcare professional with the authority to direct that individual's activities, including		
9.		medical technicians, medical assistants, orderlies, aides, and individuals acting in similar		
10.		capacities.		
11.	SECTION 3.	The Department of Health and Human Services will oversee the creation of modules to		
12.		provide education and ensure implementation of the comprehensive education		
13.		program. This training will include:		
14.		A. Education on mental health and empathy;		
15.		B. Training on taking and maintaining diligent records;		
16.		C. Effective strategies for gathering and securing evidence.		
17.		As verification of training completion, participants who successfully complete modules		
18.		will receive e-certificates to be kept on file by their employers.		
19.	SECTION 4.	Failure of organizations to comply with this bill will result in a loss of federal funding for

2.	SECTION 1.	All first responders are hereby required by law to carry naloxone when on duty and to		
3.		use it when medically indicated, i.e. they encounter a person who has overdosed.		
4.		Departments shall be required to host semiannual training on how to use naloxone.		
5.	SECTION 2.	"Naloxone" shall be defined as a synthetic drug that blocks opioid receptors in the		
6.		nervous system used to treat narcotic overdose. A "first responder" shall be defined as		
7.		someone trained to respond to an emergency, including but not limited to police		
8.		officers, firefighters, and paramedics.		
9.	SECTION 3.	The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and departments will be		
10.		responsible for the enforcement of this bill.		
11.		A. Any first responder found in violation of this bill will be fined \$500 per infraction.		
12.		B. Any department in violation of this bill will have their funding reduced by 10%		
13.		until they comply.		
14.		C. Funding for this bill will come from a 2% tax on pharmaceutical companies.		
15.	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect immediately after passage. All laws in conflict with this		
16.		legislation are hereby declared null and void.

- 7. A. No additional funding is necessary.
- 8. **SECTION 4.** This bill will be implemented immediately at the start of November 1, 2024.
- 9. **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
