

A Bill to Mandate School Resource Officers in All Colorado Schools

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

| 1 | SECTION 1. | Any school district in Colorado that receives federal funding must have a |
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| 2 | | minimum of one SRO assigned at all times. |
| 3 | SECTION 2. | An SRO is defined as a school resource officer or a police officer who has |
| 4 | | had special training on how to work with youth. Each school district has |
| 5 | | the choice to arm its SRO with basic police department-issued equipment |
| 6 | | as they see fit. |
| 7 | SECTION 3. | Any school district that fails to comply will be eligible to lose federal |
| 8 | | funding until compliance is reached. |
| 9 | SECTION 4. | This bill will be enacted by the Office of School Safety. |
| 10 | SECTION 5. | This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2025. All laws in conflict with this |
| 11 | SECTION 6. | legislation are hereby declared null and void. |

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Create a League of Territories

- 1 RESOLVED, By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, the following article is proposed
- 2 as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall be valid to all intents and
- 3 purposes as part of the Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the
- 4 several states within seven years from the date of its submission by the Congress:
- 5 ARTICLE --
- 6 SECTION 1: For all existing United States Territories a "League of Territories" shall be created
- 7 to provide those territories the representation of a total of two senators to which all states are
- 8 entitled as well as representatives, allotted proportionally to the population as a states'
- 9 representatives would be allotted, but as one whole league of territories, to operate in the
- 10 House and Senate of the United States government.
- 11 SECTION 2: All laws setting a restriction on the number of Representatives in the House of
- 12 Representatives shall expand to include the number of representatives that the League of
- 13 Territories shall receive in accordance with current representative distribution laws.
- 14 SECTION 3: All laws setting a restriction on the number of Senators in the Senate shall
- 15 expand to include two Senators that the League of Territories shall receive in accordance with
- 16 current Senator distribution laws.
- 17 SECTION 4: The Congress shall have power to enforce this article via appropriate legislation.

Bill to Ban the Adult Sentencing of Minors

| l | DE II ENACIED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: |
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| 2 | SECTION 1 . To provide rehabilitation, all minors, under the age of 18, tried for a crime, |
| 3 | may only be tried and sentenced as a juvenile. |
| 1 | SECTION 2 . Upon turning 18, all those within juvenile facilities will be sent to a parole |
| 5 | board to determine further sentencing. They may decide on whether the |
| 5 | convicted person may finish their sentence in an adult prison or may be |
| 7 | released from confinement on parole. This parole board is defined as a "panel |
| 3 | of people who decide whether an offender should be released from prison on |
|) | parole," any further details will be decided by state laws. |
| 10 | SECTION 3. The contrast between Juvenile and Adult sentencing is that Juvenile facilities |
| 12 | will house no one older than 18 years of age, and are focused on education |
| 12 | and rehabilitation of convicted persons. |
| 13 | SECTION 4. This bill will go into effect on Jan 1st, 2025 |
| 14 | SECTION 5. Any ongoing trials must follow in accordance of this bill. |
| 15 | SECTION 6. Any currently convicted persons for whom this bill applies are convicted |
| 16 | based on the law at time of sentencing. |
| 17 | SECTION 7. All laws in conflict of this legislation are hereby declared null and void. |

A Bill to Eliminate the Transportation Security Administration

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- 2 SECTION 1. The Transportation Security Administration will be eliminated, and the
- 3 federal government will now be taking a bid system from private businesses for
- 4 transportation security.
- 5 **SECTION 2**. The Transportation Security Administration is responsible for screening
- 6 passengers and baggage at more than 450 U.S. airports.
- A bid system, in this case, would be defined as the system used by the US Small
- 8 Business Administration.
- 9 Private business would be defined as a company that is owned by one person or a
- small group of people.
- 11 SECTION 3. This bill would be overseen by the Department of Homeland Security,
- in conjunction with the US Small Business Administration. The Department of
- Homeland Security will see that the dismantling of the TSA is done correctly.
- 14 Funds used previously for the TSA will be used to hire contractors.
- 15 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect at the beginning of 2026 fiscal year.
- 16 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and
- 17 void.

A Bill to Mandate Liability Insurance on Firearms

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 SECTION 1. Owners of firearms will be henceforth required to carry compulsory liability
- 3 insurance policies for each firearm owned.
- 4 SECTION 2. The term "firearm" will be defined as any weapon [including a starter gun] which
- 5 will or is designed to or may readily be converted to expel a projectile by the action of an
- 6 explosion. "Compulsory" shall be defined as insurance owners of a firearm are legally required
- 7 to buy. "Liability insurance" shall be defined as a line-item in homeowners' or renters' insurance
- 8 policies which cover third-party claims of property damage or bodily injury.
- 9 SECTION 3. The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives will oversee the
- 10 enforcement of this Bill.
- 11 A. The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives in conjunction with private
- 12 insurance companies will develop a rating-tier system for determining insurance premiums. The
- 13 baseline will be set based on the caliber and ammunition capacity of the firearm.
- 14 i. Insurance rates may be adjusted in accordance with standard practices of assessing
- 15 levels of risk (i.e. lower rates for weapons safety course certifications, in-home weapon safes)
- 16 B. The enforcement will be applied to all firearm sales and independent-party transfers
- 17 after 12:00 AM the day this bill is enacted.
- 18 C. A two-year grace period for all firearms purchased before the date this bill is enacted.
- 19 D. If any person is found to not be in accordance with this bill after the date it is enforced,
- 20 they will be charged a \$500 fine each month which they are not in compliance.
- 21 i. The money from those fines will go to the nonprofit Sandy Hook Promise.
- 22 SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2025.
- 23 SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with the legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Prohibit the Banning of Books from Public Libraries

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 SECTION 1. The banning of books from public libraries shall be prohibited.
- 3 SECTION 2. Public libraries shall be defined as a local center of information that makes all
- 4 kinds of knowledge and information readily available to its users. It is established, supported
- 5 and funded by the community, either through local, regional or national government or through
- 6 some other form of community organizations.
- 7 SECTION 3. The Institute of Museum and Library Services shall oversee the implementation
- 8 of this bill.
- 9 A. Public libraries found in noncompliance with this bill, shall lose all federal funding until
- 10 such time as all its book bans and related policies have been repealed.
- 11 SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2025.
- 12 SECTION 5. All laws in conflict are hereby declared null and void.
