A Bill to Recognize Psilocybin for Medical Use

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.		
2	The United States shall officially recognize Psilocybin for medical use for the treatment of		
3	addiction, anxiety, depression, obsessive-compulsive disorder (OCD), post-traumatic		
4	stress disorder (PTSD), and other mental health disorders, for those aged 21 and older.		
5			
6	SECTION 2.		
7	(A) Psilocybin: Psilocybin, otherwise known as "Magic Mushrooms" or "Shrooms," is a		
8	classic psychedelic compound that may have efficacy for the treatment of mood		
9	and substance abuse disorders.		
10			
11	(B) Medical use: Psilocybin may be prescribed by healthcare professionals for mental		
12	health disorders where it's deemed appropriate for treatment, and when they		
13	believe it is the best course of treatment for the patient. Psilocybin will only be		
14	administered by a licensed healthcare professional in a clinic setting. Psilocybin		
15	shall not be prescribed for consumption outside of a clinic setting. Psilocybin shall		
16	not be prescribed for consumption outside the direct supervision of a licensed		
17	healthcare professional.

19	SECTION 3.		
20	Overseeing the enactment of this will be the Food and Drug Administration (FDA),		
21	ensuring compliance with rigorous standards for safety and efficacy.

23	SECTION 4.		
24	This legislation will take effect in FY 2025. All laws in conflict with this legislation are		
25	hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Federally Mandate SROs in All Public Schools

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	All Public schools will be federally mandated to have an SRO on campus at
2		all times during school hours.
3	SECTION 2.	SROs will be defined as sworn law enforcement officers responsible for safety
4		and crime prevention in schools. Public Schools will be defined as learning
5		institutions that are funded by local, state, and/or federal government.
6	SECTION 3.	The Department of Justice will oversee the enforcement of this bill.
7	A)	Every SRO must have Police academy training as well as NASRO's 40-hour
8		Basic SRO Course, to gain extra skills on how to work and successfully
9		protect schools.
10	В)	Sros will be paid by the police department they are employed at but also
11		receive extra pay from the school as well.
12	C)	Receiving an additional 15 dollars an hour from the school as well
13	D)	The Department of Education will receive an additional 1 trillion annually
14		to be redeemed every year based on need.
15		
16	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect in FY 2025. All laws in conflict with this
		legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Mandate Compliance with the Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA) for All Companies

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	This legislation mandates that all companies within the United States,		
2		disregarding size, industry, or structure, must follow the provisions outlined $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) \left(1\right) \left($		
3		in the Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA).		
4	SECTION 2.	The FMLA entitles eligible employees of covered employers to take unpaid,		
5		job-protected leave for specified family and medical reasons with		
6		continuation of group health insurance coverage under the same terms		
7		and conditions as if the employee had not taken leave.		
8	SECTION 3.	A) The Department of Labor (DOL) shall oversee the implementation and		
9		enforcement of this bill. B) The DOL will develop guidelines and resources		
10		to assist companies in working with the FMLA regulations, violations will		
11		result in penalties and legal action.		
12	SECTION 4.	A) For first offense, the DOL will pose a fine ranging from $$5,000$ to $$10,000$		
13		per affected employee. B) For frequent offensense, the fine will be		
14		increased on a sliding scale, with a maximum of \$20,000 per employee. C)		
15		The DOL will have authority to pursue legal action against companies with		
16		long term non-compliance, and have the right to seek additional damages.		
17		D) Penalties will be based on factors as severity, the length of time of the		
18		violation and number of employees affected.		
19	SECTION 5.	This legislation shall take effect 90 days after the Bill is passed.		
20	SECTION 6.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Legalize Euthanasia

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	Legalizing euthanasia is a necessity to preserve the quality of life for those
2		who are suffering, brain dead, affected by a terminal illness, or otherwise.
3		Euthanasia is a humane and safe choice for many individuals especially
4		since the majority of physicians believe it should be provided for those who
5		are terminally ill. Additionally legalizing euthanasia will decrease the
6		amount of unsafe home treatments or suicides. The United States will
7		adopt the same requirements as Canada regarding euthanasia.
8		
9	SECTION 2.	Euthanasia will be defined as the physician-assisted painless killing of a
10		patient suffering from an incurable and painful disease, an irreversible
11		coma, or as Canadian regulations state.
12		
13	Legalization v	vill be defined as the action of making something illegal, legal, in this case
14		euthanasia; but will still require medical approval and prescription on a
15		case-by-case basis. Legalization does not mean the process will be easy but
16		rather makes euthanasia an option.
17		
18	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of Health and Human Services will oversee
19		enforcement and regulation.
20		
21	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect in FY 2026. All laws in conflict with this
22		legislation are hereby declared null and void.
