A Bill to Implement Stricter Environmental Regulations on Carbon Emissions

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	This bill proposes the implementation of stricter
2	environmenta	al regulations targeting carbon emissions to mitigate climate
3	change and re	educe the impact of greenhouse gasses on the environment.
4	SECTION 2.	Carbon emissions refer to the release of carbon dioxide
5	(CO2) and oth	ner greenhouse gasses into the atmosphere as a result of
6	human activit	ties, primarily the burning of fossil fuels such as coal, oil, and
7	natural gas.	
8	SECTION 3.	The EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) would be
9	responsible fo	or implementing and enforcing regulations related to carbon
10	emissions. Th	is would involve monitoring emissions from various sources,
11	such as powe	r plants, factories, and vehicles, to ensure compliance with
12	emission stan	dards set forth in the legislation.
13	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on December 8th, 2024. All
14	laws in conflic	ct with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
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A Bill to Reform the Criminal Justice System to Address Recidivism

1	SECTION 1 . This bill proposes significant reforms to the criminal justice
2	system aimed at reducing recidivism rates among individuals with prior
3	convictions. It includes provisions for expanding access to rehabilitation
4	programs, such as education, vocational training, and substance abuse
5	treatment, both during incarceration and after release.
6	SECTION 2 . Recidivism is when a person who has been convicted of a
7	crime commits another crime after being punished or released from prison
8	It's a measure of the likelihood of someone returning to criminal behavior.
9	SECTION 3. The Department of Justice (DOJ) will be incharge of
10	monitoring the implementation of the bill's provisions to ensure
11	compliance and effectiveness. This may involve collecting data, conducting
12	evaluations, and reporting on outcomes related to recidivism rates and the
13	impact of rehabilitation programs.
14	SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect on February 8, 2034. All laws in
15	conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
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A Bill to Regulate Social Media Platforms to Combat Propaganda

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1: The bill mandates transparency measures, such as disclosure
2	of algorithms and data practices, to enhance accountability and enable
3	users to make informed decisions about their online interactions.
4	SECTION 2. "Propaganda" refers to misleading or false information
5	disseminated through social media platforms with the intention of
6	influencing public opinion, promoting particular ideologies, or advancing
7	specific agendas.
8	SECTION 3. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC): The FCC has
9	authority over telecommunications and could be involved in regulating
10	aspects of social media platforms that involve communication networks or
11	infrastructure.
12	SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect on July 8th, 2024. All laws in
13	conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
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A Bill to Expand Affirmative Action in Federal Contracting to Enhance Workplace Diversity

1	SECTION 1.	This bill proposes to amend existing federal contracting
2	regulations t	o strengthen affirmative action requirements for federal
3	contractors a	and subcontractors.
4	SECTION 2.	Affirmative action means to promote diversity, and create
5	equal opport	tunities for individuals who have been historically marginalized
6	or underrepr	esented due to factors such as race, gender, ethnicity,
7	disability, or	socioeconomic status.
8	SECTION 3.	U.S. Department of Labor's Office of Federal Contract
9	Compliance	Programs (OFCCP) or the U.S. General Services Administration
10	(GSA) will be	incharge in order to enforce this bill in the workforce
11	A. These ag	encies will be incharge of Developing and implementing
12	guideline	es for affirmative action requirements in federal contracting.
13	B. Collecting	g and analyzing data to evaluate the effectiveness of
14	affirmativ	ve action initiatives in promoting workplace diversity and equa
15	opportur	nity.
16	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on February 8, 2027. All laws
17	in conflict wi	th this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
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A Resolution to add a legal protection of service dogs in religious spaces to the Americans with Disabilities Act

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2	WHEREAS, The Americans with Disabilities Act was created as a law to
3	protect disabled Americans from ability-driven discrimination; and
4	WHEREAS, Religious organizations are legally allowed to deny entry to
5	people based off of ability, thus resulting in individuals practicing their faith
6	in religious spaces without possible life-saving accommodations; and
7	WHEREAS, The ADA states that organizations can only deny service dog
8	entry in most spaces on the grounds of them "fundamentally altering" the
9	nature of the provided services and/or being "out of control"; and
10	WHEREAS, The ADA can be more effective in its mission by addressing this
11	form of discrimination; now, therefore, be it
12	RESOLVED, That the Congress here assembled adds a legal protection
13	against the discrimination of service dogs and their users in religious spaces
14	under the American with Disabilities Act; and, be it
15	$\textbf{FURTHER RESOLVED,} \ \textbf{That religious organizations should henceforth not be}$
16	exempt from the legal protection when committing discrimination under
17	the ideology of the separation of church and state.

A Bill to Restrict Fast Fashion Imports from Other Countries

1	SECTION 1.	This bill will reduce the frequency of "fast fashion" imports in	
2	order to redu	uce demand for such products, thus preventing further	
3	environmental damage.		
4	SECTION 2.	Fast fashion is defined as "inexpensive clothing produced	
5	rapidly by ma	ass-market retailers in response to the latest trends". "Fast	
6	fashion" ofte	n takes unethical means to mass produce their items.	
7	SECTION 3.	The U.S. Customs and Border Protection will be overseeing	
8	the impleme	ntation of this bill.	
9	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on March 3, 2024. All laws in	
10	conflict with	this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to remove speed limits on the Interstate Highway System

1	SECTION 1.	Drivers with an active and validated driver's license will no
2	longer have to	abide by speed limits while driving on the Interstate
3	Highway Syste	em.
4	SECTION 2.	Speed limits set the legal maximum speed at which vehicles
5	may travel on	a given stretch of road.
6	SECTION 3.	The U.S. Department of Transportation's Federal Highway
7	Administration	n will oversee enforcement of this bill.
8	A. To ensure	the safety of all drivers and passengers, a driver will adhere
9	to the Left	-Lane Law which states that a driver cannot be in the
10	left-lane u	nless they are passing another vehicle in the right lane or
11	traffic is co	ongested to the point where the driver cannot enter the right
12	lane. This	Left-Lane Law will be enforced by local law enforcement.
13	B. Advisory s	peed signs will be posted for a given stretch of road, but the
14	speed liste	ed will not be enforced.
15	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2025. All laws in
16	conflict with t	his legislation are hereby declared null and void.
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A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Establish the United States as a Constitutional Monarchy

1	RESOLVED,	By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the
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3	following arti	cle is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the
4	United States	s, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the
5	Constitution	when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the
6	several states	within seven years from the date of its submission by the
7	Congress:	
8		ARTICLE
9	SECTION 1:	All United States states and territories shall initially vote for
10		somebody to start the royal line, and whoever has the
11		majority popular vote shall be labeled the current King of
12		the United States of America. Henceforth, the president
13		shall be replaced with the King position, and term limits
14		shall be abolished. The next in line to inherit the throne shall
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16		be the offspring of the King, and presuming the King has no
17		offspring, it shall be the nearest blood-related living relative
18		of the King. All duties and responsibilities of the president
19		shall be inherited by the current King at the time.
20	SECTION 2:	The 14th Amendment of the United States of America shall
21		hereby be repealed.
22	SECTION 3:	Congress shall have the power to enforce this article by
		appropriate pieces of legislation.

A Bill to prohibit toxic chemicals in the manufacturing of consumable products

1	SECTION 1.	Consumable Products such as silverware, cups, plates and
2	other items in	ntended to be touched by your mouth should be prohibited
3	from being so	old to people if lead is used in the manufacturing process.
4	SECTION 2.	Lead in its various forms poses several dangers to human
5	health and th	e environment due to its toxicity.
6	SECTION 3.	The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS)
7	will enforce t	his bill.
8	A. Silverwar	e items that are intended to come into contact with your
9	mouth sh	ould be prohibited if lead is used in the manufacturing
10	process ir	order to protect users from chemicals that may harm their
11	health. Th	nere have been various health conditions linked to the
12	chemical	known as "lead" such as cardiovascular disease, bone and
13	joint prob	lems, anemia, and more.
14	B. The U.S D	epartment of Health should see to it that the manufacturing
15	of such p	roducts should not be sold in retailer shops.
16	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on February 6, 2025. All laws
17	in conflict wit	th this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
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A Bill to Mitigate Product Waste by Requiring Stores to Donate all Excess Viable Products

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L	SECTION 1 . In instances where many retail stores would destroy
2	and/or throw away unsold merchandise, all products still safe to use for
3	their intended purpose are to be donated to local homeless shelters.
4	SECTION 2 . All products not intended for destruction or disposal are
5	not required to be donated. Specifically, the products must be
6	"determin[ed] toa particular act or to act in a particular manner for a
7	specific reason".
3	SECTION 3. The Consumer Product Safety Commission will oversee
9	the implementation of this bill.
10	A. All "safe" products can be classified under the regulations and
11	standards set by the Consumer Product Safety Commission.
12	B. Compliance will be monitored and regulated within the commission.
13	Those in violation will be fined \$1,000 per pound of mis-regulated
14	merchandise.
15	SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect on April 4th, 2024. All laws
16	in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
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A Bill to Extend Public WiFi Coverage to Parks

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	This bill will implement free public WiFi coverage to parks
2	throughout th	e United States.
3	SECTION 2.	A park is defined as a large public green area in a town or
4	city used for re	ecreation.
5	SECTION 3.	The National Recreation and Park Association will oversee
6	the implemen	tation of this bill.
7	A. The WiFi t	hat is provided will run at the speed of 2.4 GHz.
8	B. The WiFi t	hat is provided must be accessible by all wireless devices with
9	Bluetooth	capability.
10	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1st, 2025, and all
11	parks in these	United States will provide free public WiFi by January 1st,
12	2029. All laws	in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and
13	void.	
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A Bill to Implement a Four-Day School Week in Public Schools

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	This bill will require all public education institutions in these
2	United States	to implement a four-day school week.
3	SECTION 2.	A public school is a school that is supported by public funds.
4	Four-day scho	ol weeks consist of four continuous days separated by
5	three-day wee	ekends.
6	SECTION 3.	The U.S. Department of Education will oversee the
7	implementati	on of this bill. All public education institutions grades K-12 will
8	be required to	o follow this implementation.
9	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on July 1st, 2028. All laws in
10	conflict with t	his legislation are hereby declared null and void.
