A Bill to Eliminate Homeschooling

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	Home schooling will no longer be a legally permissible form of education in
2		the United States.
3		
4	SECTION 2.	All students currently participating in a homeschooling program will need
5		to enroll in a recognized public or private school by September 1st, 2024.
6		Any virtual schooling option must be run directly through the local, publicl
7		funded school district.
8		
9	SECTION 3.	In order for a private school to be considered a valid schooling option, the
10		building that houses academics must not serve as any person's primary
11		residence.

A Bill to Provide Paid FMLA Leave

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2. Section 1. All employees will be given 12 weeks of federally funded, paid
- 3. Family and Medical leave (FMLA)
- 4. SECTION 2. Up to \$4000 per month will be paid to those on FMLA, designed
- 5. to replace a minimum of two-thirds of average weekly wages, rising to Eighty
- 6. Percent for the lowest-wage workers.
- 7. Section 2. This policy will be phased in over a ten year period, guaranteeing
- 8. twelve weeks of paid, parental, family illness, or safety related leave by year ten. Workers will receive three days of bereavement per year starting in year one.
- 9. Section 3. Funding for the bill will come from an increase in the federal
- 10. income tax rate for the top one percent of American income earners from
- 11. 37% to 39.6% and an increase in capital gains and dividend tax rates for
- 12. those who earn more than \$1 Million per year.
- 13. **SECTION 4.** This legislation will be overseen by the Department of Labor.
- 14. **SECTION 5.** This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2024.
- 15. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Require Recycling and Composting Infrastructure for all Entities Receiving Government Funding

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	All facilities operated by organizations receiving federal funding will be
2		required to implement Recycling and Composting policies and
3		infrastructure in their facilities.
4	SECTION 2.	"Infrastructure" is defined as the means to properly recycle and compost
5		any recyclable/compostable items through simple and common means.
6		"Policies" is defined as any rule or policy encouraging the usage of recycling
7		and composting infrastructure and any education on those topics as
8		necessary.
9.	SECTION 3.	A. This will be overseen by the EPA in collaboration with local and state
10.		governments as they see fit, with federal intervention(Ex: audits) as
11		necessary
12		B. Funding will be provided for organizations coming up to compliance.
13		This funding will be derived from a federal tax of .5% imposed on the
14		purchase of single use plastic bottles(including styrofoam).
15	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2025.
16	SECTION 5.	Timeline to establish compliance deadlines will be determined by the EPA.
17	SECTION 6.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Make Intensive Factory Farming Illegal to Protect the Welfare of Animals

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	Intensive/Factory Farming will be banned to ensure humane treatment of
2		farm animals. Manufacturers that violate this bill will be fined, along with
3		distributors who are purchasing goods. The factory will also be seized until
4		humane treatment of farm animals is ensured.
5	SECTION 2.	Factory Farming shall be defined as a system of rearing livestock using
6		intensive methods designed to maximize profits and minimize cost.
7		The Term Farm Animals includes, but is not limited to, poultry, pigs or
8		cattle.
9		Humane Treatment shall be defined as the treatment in which farm
10		animals are free to express normal behavior, by providing sufficient space,
11		proper facilities, and company of the animals own kind in a natural
12		environment.
13	SECTION 3.	The U.S Department of Agriculture and the Animal and Plant Health
14		Inspection Service (APHIS) will oversee this bill by monitoring producers of
15		farm animal products every 6 months, guaranteeing proper farm animal
16		care.
17		A. An inspection involves checking the farm animals environment, diet
18		and health.
19	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2026. All laws in conflict with
20		this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

	BE IT ENACTED	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
1	SECTION 1.	The records of former felons who do not commit any crimes after being
2		released from prison for 4 years.

4	SECTION 2. Ex	xpungement is defined by the process of sealing or destroying an
5		individual's criminal record to restore the person to the position they
6		occupied before their involvement in the criminal justice system.
7		
8	SECTION 2. Th	nis expungement will be automatic and will not require any action by the
9		individuals seeking to clear their records.

11	SECTION 3.	The exceptions are sex crimes and domestic violence.
12	SECTION 4.	This legislation will be overseen by the Department of Justice.

A Bill to Promote Affordable Postsecondary Education

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	All U.S. citizens shall be entitled to equal and affordable postsecondary
2		education, thereby protecting students from exorbitant student loan debts,
3		fostering a more proficient workforce, and promoting economic mobility,
4		prosperity, and competitiveness in the global economy. Thus, no eligible
5		institution shall charge an annual in-state or out-of-state tuition exceeding
6		\$7,500. Eligible institutions shall also be incentivized to expand scholarship
7		programs. Additionally, the Free Postsecondary Education Program shall
8		allow eligible individuals to be enrolled in eligible institutions for a time
9		period of no more than four years and all tuition costs due within this
10		period shall be waived.
11	SECTION 2.	Postsecondary education shall be defined as any education beyond high
12		school, including but not limited to community colleges, vocational schools,
13		technical schools, and four-year colleges and universities. An eligible
14		institution shall be defined as any public institution recognized by the
15		Department of Education that offers postsecondary education.
16	SECTION 3.	To be eligible for the Free Postsecondary Education Program, an individual
17		must be a documented U.S. citizen or a legal permanent resident currently
18		living below their state poverty line. Eligibility shall be determined based
19		on a sliding scale that counts for the individual or family's income, ensuring
20		that those with the greatest financial need receive the most aid.
21	SECTION 4.	The Department of Education, relevant federal agencies, and state
22		governments shall coordinate to oversee the implementation of the Free
23		Postsecondary Education Program. All necessary funding to cover costs as a
24		result of this legislation will be allocated by the general fund of the
25		Treasury to the necessary entities with a budget of \$15 billion annually. No
26		new taxes shall be levied for the purpose of this legislation.

This legislation will take effect at the end of the current academic year. All eligible institutions are expected to be in compliance with this legislation by October 1, 2024. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Revise the Process of Drawing Congressional Districts Utilizing Artificial Intelligence to Prevent Gerrymandering

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	Artificial Intelligence will be utilized in order to create
2		congressional districts instead of our current processes, which are
3		done by state officials.
4	SECTION 2.	Artificial Intelligence: Computer systems able to perform tasks that
5		normally require human intelligence, such as visual perception,
6		speech recognition, decision-making, and translation between
7		languages.
8	SECTION 3.	All contracting, enforcement, and technical management will be
9		taken care of by the federal elections commission as they have done
10		in the past.
11		A. The AI will take into account population, political borders, and
12		cultural borders when drawing the districts.
13		B. The borders will be redrawn every ten years in coordination with
14		data from the Census.
15		C. The first time these processes will be utilized will be in
16		coordination with the 2030 census.
17		D. All funding needed will come from lobby tax.
18	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect Immediately All laws in conflict with

A Bill to Mandate Sidewalks on Roads

1	SECTION 1.	Sidewalks, or pedestrian pavements shall be required on each side of the
2		road that is not considered a "highway".
3	SECTION 2.	"Sidewalk" or "pedestrian pavements" shall be defined as a portion of
4		street between the curb lines of roadways and adjacent property lines
5		intended for use by pedestrians, it should be 48 inches wide and properly
6		lit.
7	SECTION 3.	The term "Highway" shall be defined as a stretch of road that doesn't have
8		frequent stops and is intended for high speeds on vehicles.
9	SECTION 4.	The Department of Transportation and Infrastructure will oversee this, by
10		making sure that a sidewalk is added to streets that don't have any.
11		A. The Federal Government will allocate funds to states Department of
12		Transportation and Infrastructure in order to build sidewalks
13	SECTION 5.	This legislation will take effect on December 1, 2024. All laws in conflict

A Bill to Institute Rank Choice Voting in National Elections

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

l	SECTION 1 .	The United States shall host general national elections under a rank choice voting
2		system(also known as instant runoff voting) under which each voter shall rank the
3		candidates for the office in the order of the voter's preference, in accordance with
1		this title.
5	SECTION 2.	Rank choice voting allows people to vote for multiple candidates, in order of
5		preference. The candidate who did the worst is eliminated, and that candidate's
7		voters' ballots are redistributed to their second-choice pick. That process continues
,		until there is a candidate who has the majority of votes. The candidate with the
5		majority (more than 50%) of first-choice popular votes wins outright.
)	SECTION 3.	This legislation shall be enforced by the US Department of Justice.
10	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2028.
11	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Require All Public Employees be Vaccinated

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	Any person employed by the government in a publicly funded position shall
2		be required to be vaccinated once a year for the COVID-19 virus and any of
3		its variations or other viruses deemed important by the Surgeon General.
4		
5	SECTION 2.	The vaccination expectation applies to all government workers, including
6		but not limited to: workers of the Federal government, state government,
7		local school district, public libraries, law enforcement, and the military.
8		
9	SECTION 3.	Any person hired to do contract work for the government shall also be
10		subject to the vaccination requirement if their contract is for work that will
11		take longer than 365 days.
12		
	SECTION 4.	This legislation will go into effect on December 31st, 2024. All workers will
		have 365 to become vaccinated. Failure to meet the vaccination
		requirement will result in termination of employment.
