# Judge Cheat Sheet: Speech Events

This sheet is designed to provide a basic guideline to the criteria that can be used for judging individual events. Remember, <u>feedback is crucial!</u> Let them know of things they did well, but also what they could improve on. <u>Ballots are at live.speechwire.com</u> As soon as you are in your room, press "Start Round" in Speechwire. (Go ahead and start the round, even if all competitors are not there. Allow late competitors in to compete.)

# Extemporaneous (EXT)

In a prep room (not your room), competitors are presented with a choice of three questions related to national and international current events. The competitor has 30 minutes to prepare a seven-minute speech answering the selected question. You will receive competitors one at a time, in 10-minute increments. Each student should stay to watch the remaining competitors.

#### Judging:

- 5- 7-minute speech (only valid if timed with stopwatch)
- Time violations cannot place first (30 second grace period).
- NO NOTES (PAPER OR DIGITAL)
- Those using notes should not rank first in the round.
- Factually accurate
- Organized, focused, research referenced.
- Your opinion on the topic should <u>not</u> influence the ranking.

# Original Oratory (OO)

Competitors write,
memorize, and deliver a
speech with the intent to
inform or persuade the
audience on a topic of
significance. It usually has
a problem, with causes,
effects, and solutions.
Competitors should
remain in the room for the
remaining competitors'
speeches.

#### Judging:

- Time: up to 10 minutes (only valid if timed with stopwatch)
- Time violations cannot place first (30 second grace period).
- NO NOTES (PAPER OR DIGITAL)
- Those using notes should not rank first in the round.
- Organized, flows, easy-to-follow, clear message, entertaining.
- Your opinion on the topic should <u>not</u> influence the ranking.

# Declamation (DEC)

Competitors memorize and deliver a portion or portions of a published, publicly delivered speech previously performed by someone else (commencement addresses, historical speeches, political speeches, etc.). There will be a brief introduction to the piece near the beginning of the speech.

### Judging:

- Time: up to 10 minutes (only valid if timed with stopwatch)
- Time violations cannot place first (30 second grace period).
- NO NOTES (PAPER OR DIGITAL)
- Those using notes should not rank first in the round.
- Entertaining, flows, relatable
- Your opinion on the topic should <u>not</u> influence the ranking.

## Impromptu (IMP)

Competitors have 7 minutes to select a topic, brainstorm their ideas, outline and deliver a speech. The speech is given without notes and uses an introduction, body and conclusion. The judge will give 2-3 topic choices and the competitor will choose one. The 7 minutes will start once the student chooses the topic (that topic is no longer valid for any other competitor). Competitors should remain in the room for all speeches.

#### Judging:

- Time: up to 7 minutes (only valid if timed with stopwatch)
- 7 minutes includes preparation time **and** giving the speech.
- Time violations cannot place first (30 second grace period).
- NO NOTES (PAPER OR DIGITAL)
- Those using notes should not rank first in the round.
- Organized, focused on topic, supported using examples, facts, etc.
- Your opinion on the topic should <u>not</u> influence the ranking.

# Interpretation (HI, DI, DUO)

Competitors memorize and perform a published scene portraying either single or multiple characters. PROPS ARE NOT PERMITTED (any item is considered a prop: chair, table, etc.). In DUO, competitors may not make eye contact, nor touch. There will be a brief introduction to the piece near the beginning of the piece.

#### Judging:

- Time: up to 10 minutes
- Time violations cannot place first (30 second grace period).
- NO NOTES (PAPER OR DIGITAL)
- Those using notes should not rank first in the round.
- **DUO** Students do not touch or have eye contact except during the introduction.
- Entertaining, characters clearly defined and differentiated, plot makes sense.
- Your opinion on the topic should <u>not</u> influence the ranking.

# Poetry & Prose (POE & PRO)

Competitors deliver dramatic readings of published poems or pieces of published works.
Competitors will have a black binder to refer to, but most of their speech should be **memorized** (they should not be just reading from the binder, only referring to it).

There will be a brief introduction to the piece near the beginning of the piece.

#### Judging:

- Time: up to 7 minutes
- Time violations should not place first (30 second grace period).
- Students may not step away from performance spot
- Entertaining, passionate, easy to follow
- Your opinion on the topic should <u>not</u> influence the ranking.

# Informative (INFO)

A self-written speech on a topic of their choice, using logic and evidence to inform, not advocate. Visual aids are allowed. Visual aids should be used to enhance the speech, but not distract from the speech or be the main focal point. All research should be cited verbally.

#### Judging:

- Time: up to 10 minutes
- Time violations should not place first (30 second grace period).
- Focused on topic
- Organized and factual information with support of sources.
- Should educate and entertain
- Visual aids are engaging and have smooth delivery
- Your opinion on the topic should <u>not</u> influence the ranking.

## Storytelling (STY)

Competitors share a story with an audience, performed as if the audience were a group of young children. Competitors may use a full range of movement to express themselves and may incorporate a chair in a variety of ways, though the chair may not be used as a prop or moved once started.

- Time: up to 5 minutes (only valid if timed with stopwatch)
- Time violations cannot place first (30 second grace period).
- NO NOTES (PAPER OR DIGITAL) Those using notes should not rank first in the round.
- Entertaining, characters clearly defined and differentiated, plot makes sense.

# In ALL Speech Events: Please look for the following: eye contact, confidence, articulation... (PVLEGS: Poise, Voice, Life, Eye contact, Gestures, Speed) Please make detailed comments on each ballot (positive & areas of improvement). Rank students in first to last, no ties. Issue speaker points, 90 to 100 (highest points to 1st)

# Judge Cheat Sheet: Debate Events

This sheet is designed to provide a basic guideline to the criteria that can be used for judging individual events. Remember, feedback is crucial! Let them know of things they did well, but also what they could improve on. Ballots are at live speechwire.com As soon as you are in your room, press "Start Round" in Speechwire.

## Student Congress (CON)

Contestants in Student Congress become legislators charged with the task of fulfilling the responsibilities of the US legislative branch of the federal government. There is a chamber of 15-18 competitors, as well as a PO (Presiding Officer-will run the room using Parliamentary Procedure)

#### Regulations

- Student speeches are up to 3 minutes (PO will announce speech times)
- Legislation authors have 2 minutes mandatory questioning period
- All other questioning periods are 1 minute.
- Students may not have visual aids
- Speech should be on appropriate topic/side
- Focused on topic, organized, factual accuracy, good composition, references
- Eye Contact, confidence, appropriate/professional tone

Score every ballot – points range from 1 (poor) to 6 (excellent).

Competitors should not receive extra points for questioning, however it should help determine ranking if the speech points are tied.

Your opinion on the topic should **not** influence the ranking.

Competitors rank 1 (best) -8 (look at how many speeches they made, how many points you gave for each speech, their decorum towards the chamber, participation, questioning, etc.)

Please make detailed positive and constructive comments on each student ballot.

## Public Forum (PF)

Team event that advocates or rejects a position posed by the resolution. Teams will be assigned pro/con prior to the round, indicated on the ballot.
