A Bill to Implement a Standardized National Curriculum

- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS CONGRESS THAT:
- 5 SECTION 1. The federal government shall implement a national curriculum for K-12 education
- 6 to ensure equitable access to quality education across all states.
- 7 SECTION 2. For the purposes of this Act:
- 8 "National Curriculum" refers to a standardized set of educational standards and guidelines for
- 9 core subjects and critical skills that all K-12 schools in the United States will follow.
- 10 "K-12 education" encompasses all educational programs from kindergarten through 12th 11 grade.
- 12 "National Curriculum Development Board (N-CDB)" refers to a government-appointed body
- 13 consisting of educators, subject matter experts, and community stakeholders responsible for
- 14 developing, implementing, and evaluating the national curriculum.
- 15 SECTION 3. The U.S. Department of Education shall oversee the enforcement of this bill,
- 16 utilizing the National Curriculum Development Board (N-CDB) to develop, implement, and
- 17 evaluate the national curriculum.
- 18 SECTION 4. The implementation of the national curriculum shall begin five years after the
- 19 N-CDB submits the proposed curriculum to Congress and it is approved.
- 20 SECTION 5. All other laws that are in conflict with this new policy shall hereby be declared null
- 21 and void.

A Bill to Fund the Great Green Wall to Slow Down Climate

- 3 Change, Desertification, and Poverty in Africa
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 5 SECTION 1. The United States shall provide funding to African Nations in
- 6 order for them to be able to continue and have better construction on the
- 7 Great Green Wall.
- 8 SECTION 2. The Great Green Wall is a project led by the African Union,
- 9 initially conceived as a way to combat desertification, climate change, and
- 10 extreme poverty in the Sahel Region, and hold back expansion of the
- 11 Sahara by planting a wall of trees stretching across the entire Sahel.
- 12 SECTION 3. This legislation shall be enforced by the US agency for
- 13 International Development to fund the Great Green Wall.
- 14 A. A \$1 billion dollar annual fund shall be allocated to the US Agency for
- 15 International Development to fund the Great Green Wall.
- 16 SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect at the start of FY 2025.
- 17 SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared
- 18 null and void.
- 19 Introduced for Congressional Debate.

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2 A Bill to Establish Economic Stabilization Initiatives in Afghanistan

- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS CONGRESS THAT:
- 4 SECTION 1. The United States shall implement comprehensive economic stabilization
- 5 initiatives in Afghanistan to promote sustainable economic growth, enhance local governance,
- 6 and improve the livelihoods of Afghan citizens.
- 7 SECTION 2. For the purposes of this Act:
- 8 "Economic Stabilization Initiatives" refers to programs and policies aimed at rebuilding
- 9 infrastructure, creating jobs, providing education and vocational training, and supporting local
- 10 businesses in Afghanistan.
- 11 "Sustainable Development" means economic growth that meets the needs of the present
- 12 without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs.
- 13 SECTION 3. The U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) shall oversee the
- 14 enforcement of this bill, coordinating with international partners, non-governmental
- 15 organizations, and Afghan local authorities to implement the economic stabilization initiatives.
- 16 SECTION 4. The overall financial cost of these initiatives is estimated at \$500 million over five
- 17 years, subject to annual appropriations by Congress. This funding will be allocated for
- 18 infrastructure development, vocational training programs, and microloans for local businesses.
- 19 SECTION 5. The implementation of these initiatives shall begin within six months of the
- 20 enactment of this bill and shall be reviewed annually for effectiveness and adaptability.
- 21 SECTION 6. All other laws that are in conflict with this new policy shall hereby be declared null
- 22 and void.

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Replace the Electoral College with Ranked Choice Voting

- 4 RESOLVED, By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the following article is
- 5 proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall be valid to all
- 6 intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths
- 7 of the several states within seven years from the date of its submission by the Congress:
- 8 ARTICLE 2
- 9 SECTION 1: The Electoral College system established by Article II, Section 1 of the Constitution
- 10 shall be replaced with a system of ranked choice voting for the election of the President and
- 11 Vice President of the United States. Ranked choice voting allows voters to rank candidates in
- 12 order of preference, ensuring a more representative electoral process.
- 13 SECTION 2: The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation,
- 14 providing guidelines for the implementation of ranked choice voting and ensuring voter
- 15 education initiatives are in place to inform the electorate about the new system.

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A Resolution to Nationalize Railroads to Ensure Federal Ownership and Operation of Rail Infrastructure

- 4 WHEREAS, the current fragmentation and privatization of the railroad system has led to
- 5 inefficiencies and inequities in transportation; and
- 6 WHEREAS, the lack of coordinated management in the rail industry results in inconsistent
- 7 service, safety concerns, and unequal access to rail infrastructure across regions; and
- 8 WHEREAS, these issues hinder economic growth, increase environmental impacts, and limit
- 9 the potential for sustainable transportation solutions; and
- 10 WHEREAS, federal ownership and operation of railroads would provide a unified system that
- 11 prioritizes public interest, safety, and environmental stewardship; now, therefore, be it
- 12 RESOLVED, That the Congress here assembled shall take action to nationalize the railroads of
- 13 the United States, establishing a federal system for the ownership and operation of all rail
- 14 infrastructure; and, be it
- 15 FURTHER RESOLVED, That Congress shall allocate necessary funding and resources to
- 16 implement this transition effectively, ensuring equitable access and service for all citizens.

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A Resolution to Stop Arms Sales and Military Training to Saudi

- 3 WHEREAS, The US has sent 3 billion dollars in arms to Saudi Arabia from 2015 to 2020;
- 4 and
- 5 WHEREAS, Saudi Arabia is using these arms to fight a proxy war with Iran in Yemen; and
- 6 WHEREAS, Saudi Arabia's air campaign alone in Yemen has killed over 24,000 people,
- 7 9000 of which are non-combatants and civilians; and
- 8 WHEREAS, There is evidence that Saudi Arabia funds and actively supports Al Qaeda;
- 9 and
- 10 WHEREAS, Saudi Arabia uses police and military force to oppress women, LGBTQ people,
- 11 and religious minorities
- 12 WHEREAS, Saudi Arabia funded half of Hamas's budget in the early 2000's and continue
- 13 to today; now, therefore, be it
- 14 RESOLVED, By the Congress here assembled that the US stop all arms sales and military
- 15 training to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia.

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Bill to Implement a Carbon Tax

- 2 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 3 SECTION 1. A carbon tax shall hereby be imposed of initially \$60 per metric ton of CO2
- 4 emitted by for-profit companies, which shall initially only be applied to
- 5 companies that emit greater than 30 metric tons of CO2 per year. However,
- 6 after 2035, the tax shall be applied to all for-profit companies and shall be
- 7 \$100 per metric ton of CO2 emitted. The tax revenue generated shall go to
- 8 the EPA and shall also aid the transition from fossil fuels to environmentally
- 9 sustainable energy.

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- 10 SECTION 2. "Company carbon emissions" is defined as carbon gas emissions that are
- 11 influenced by the direct decisions of for-profit corporations (which do
- 12 business in the U.S., onshore or offshore) for each calendar year. This
- 13 includes, but is not limited to, all emissions from the supply chain, logistics,
- 14 usage phase, transportation, and which the company oversees and is
- 15 directly responsible for. SECTION 3. The Internal Revenue Service shall implement a tax of \$60
- 16 per metric ton of carbon emitted per calendar year (above the threshold of 30 tons of CO2)
- 17 for U.S. based for-profit organizations
- 18 A. After 2035, there shall not be a threshold of 30 tons of CO2, and every
- 19 metric ton of CO2 which for-profit companies emit will be taxed
- 20 B. After 2035, the tax per metric ton of CO2 emitted by each company per
- 21 calendar year shall be raised to \$100
- 22 The taxes will go toward the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)
- 23 A. the EPA will use these taxes to aid the transition away from fossil fuels
- 24 to renewable, environmental energy
- 25 SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect on FY 2025. All laws in conflict with this
- 26 legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to provide Universal Healthcare for all to

- 2 Improve American Medical Coverage
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 4 SECTION 1. All United States citizens shall be provided universal healthcare.
- 5 SECTION 2. Universal healthcare shall be defined as healthcare all citizens will have
- 6 access to and not be charged for.
- 7 SECTION 3. The department of health and human services will be responsible for the
- 8 implementation of this legislation.
- 9 SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2025 All laws in conflict with
- 10 this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

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A Bill to Invest in Green Jobs to Help the Environment

- 2 and the Economy
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 4 SECTION 1. The United States will cut oil subsidies by 50% to invest in green jobs.
- 5 SECTION 2. Investment shall be defined as funding given for the creation of green
- 6 jobs and the retraining of employees. A minimum of 20% of funding will
- 7 be given for nuclear energy. Green jobs shall be defined as working in the
- 8 renewable energy industry.
- 9 SECTION 3. The Environmental Protection Agency shall be in charge of the oversight
- 10 of this legislation.
- 11 SECTION 4. This bill will take effect immediately upon passage.
- 12 SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
