10		mediate a permanent border agreement in Kashmir between China, India,

12	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the stance of the United States should remain neutral,		
13		determining a solution based exclusively upon fair compensation of all	
14		parties and the principle of self-determination for the people of Kashmir.

7	SECTION 1 . In the United States all drivers starting at the age of fifty will be required to retest				
8	every ten years until the age of seventy where they will be required to retest every five years.

10	SECTION 2 . Driving retest will consist of only a written retest from ages fifty to seventy.				
11	Afterwhich, from the age of seventy on, the retest will consist of both a written and a driving				
12	test. If the driver is deemed unfit to be on the road, their license will be revoked until they are				
13	tested fit to be driving.

15	SECTION 3. This legislation will be overseen by the U.S. Department of Motor Vehicles				
	6 (DMV). Funding for this legislation will come from the cost of the retest. All entities found to				
17	be in violation of this bill will be audited and fined an amount no less than \$100 per offense.

A Resolution to Affirm the Right to Protest on College Campuses

1	WHEREAS	Students are a primary source of income for their universities; and
2	WHEREAS	This reality should make universities very sensitive to students' political and ethical
3		concerns; and
4	WHEREAS	Rhetoric around college protesters has become increasingly vitriolic and is consequently
5		serving to marginalize and suppress the voices of these students who seek to exercise their
6		democratic rights; now, therefore be it
7	RESOLVED	by the Congress here assembled that college students who choose to engage in peaceful
8		protest to express their political perspectives are celebrated for doing so; and be it
9	FURTHER F	RESOLVED that Congress calls upon universities to refrain from discouraging or disbanding
10		peaceful protests, lest our nation's most prized values be compromised.



A Bill to Incentivize Domestic Manufacturing

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2. SECTION 1. The United States shall provide a 6 percent corporate income
- 3. tax reduction to companies in the manufacturing sector. In order to be
- 4. eligible for the incentive, all components of the product must be
- 5. manufactured in the United States.
- 6. SECTION 2. The "manufacturing sector" shall be defined as the sector
- 7. that comprises establishments engaged in the mechanical, physical, or
- 8. chemical transformation of materials, substances, or components into new
- 9. products.
- 10. SECTION 3. The Internal Revenue Service and Department of Commerce
- 11. shall be responsible for implementing this legislation.
- 12. SECTION 4. This legislation shall be implemented beginning in 2020
- calendar tax year.
- 14. SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared
- null and void

A BILL TO PHASE OUT THE FEDERAL USE OF PRIVATE PRISONS

T	BE II ENACTE	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States federal government will phase out the use of private prisons
3		and/or for-profit prisons.
4	SECTION 2.	A private prison or for-profit prison shall be defined as a place in which
5		individuals are physically confined or incarcerated by a third party that is
6		contracted by a government agency.
7		Phase out shall be defined as the act of discontinuing a process or project.
8	SECTION 3.	Immediately from passage, every year the United States will reduce the number
9		of prisoners in private prisons by 20% from the number at the time of passage.
10		Therefore, in five years, the use of private prisons shall be completely phased
11		out.
12		A. All contracts with private prison corporations shall be terminated and no new
L3		contracts shall be implemented.
L4	SECTION 4.	This legislation will go into effect immediately.
15	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
